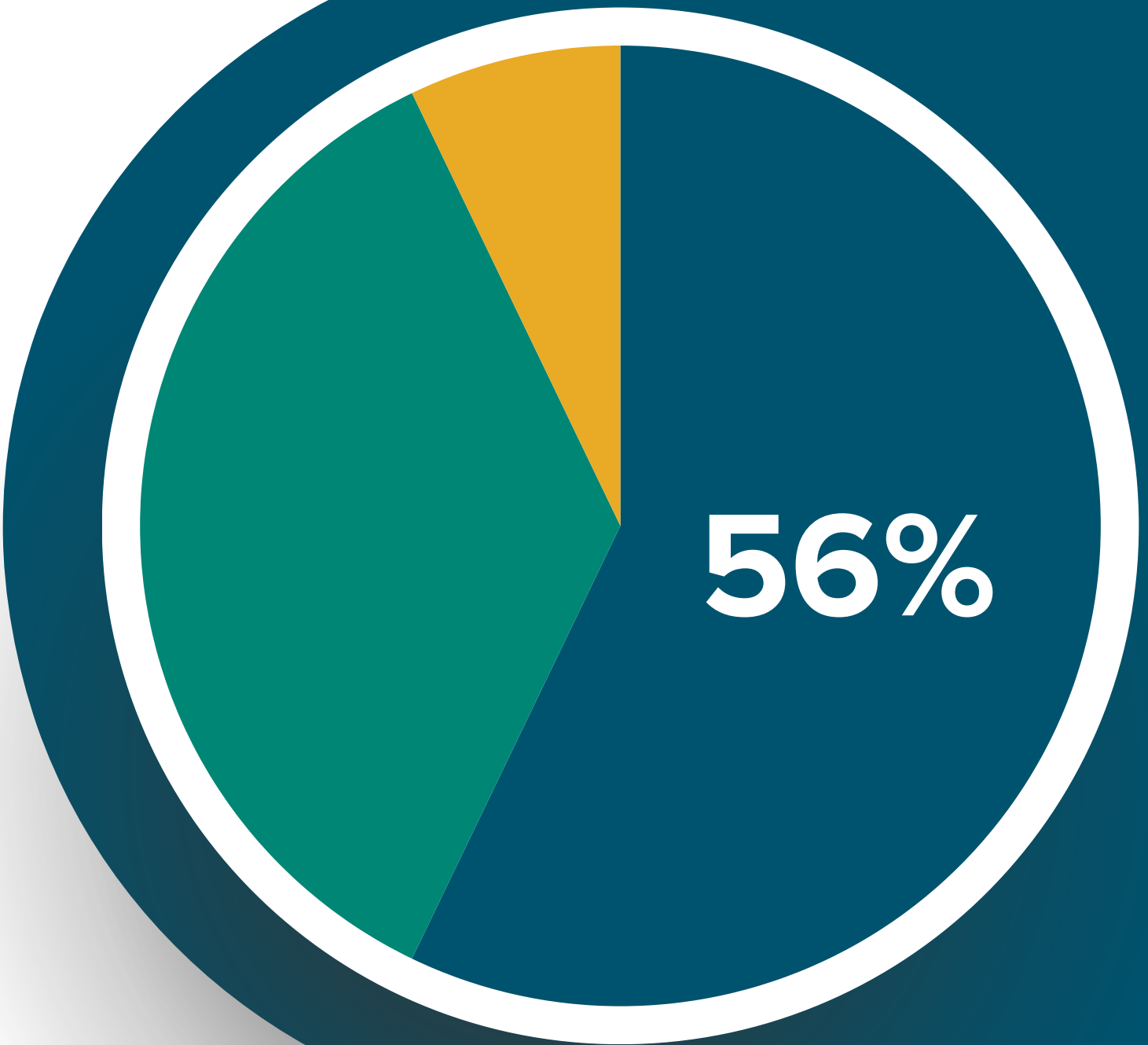

ALLOCATION

Allocation based funding is funding that is claimed annually and does not roll over.

This funding requires staffing reports and time studies to pull funding for work being completed within the department.

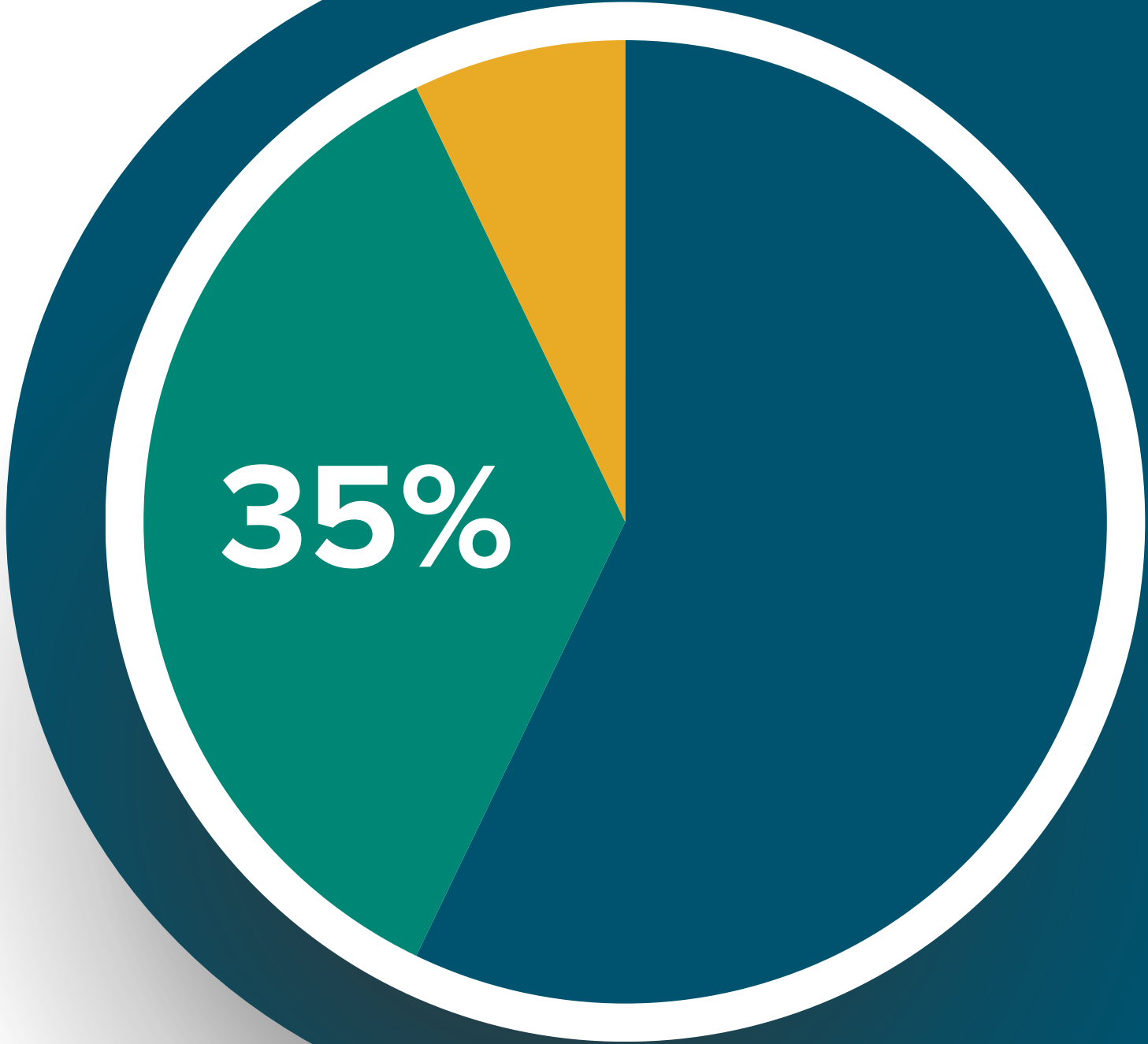


Department Funding Information

REALIGNMENT

Realignment based funding is received from State sales tax revenue and is used to fund the county portion of public assistance benefits as well as mandated programs.

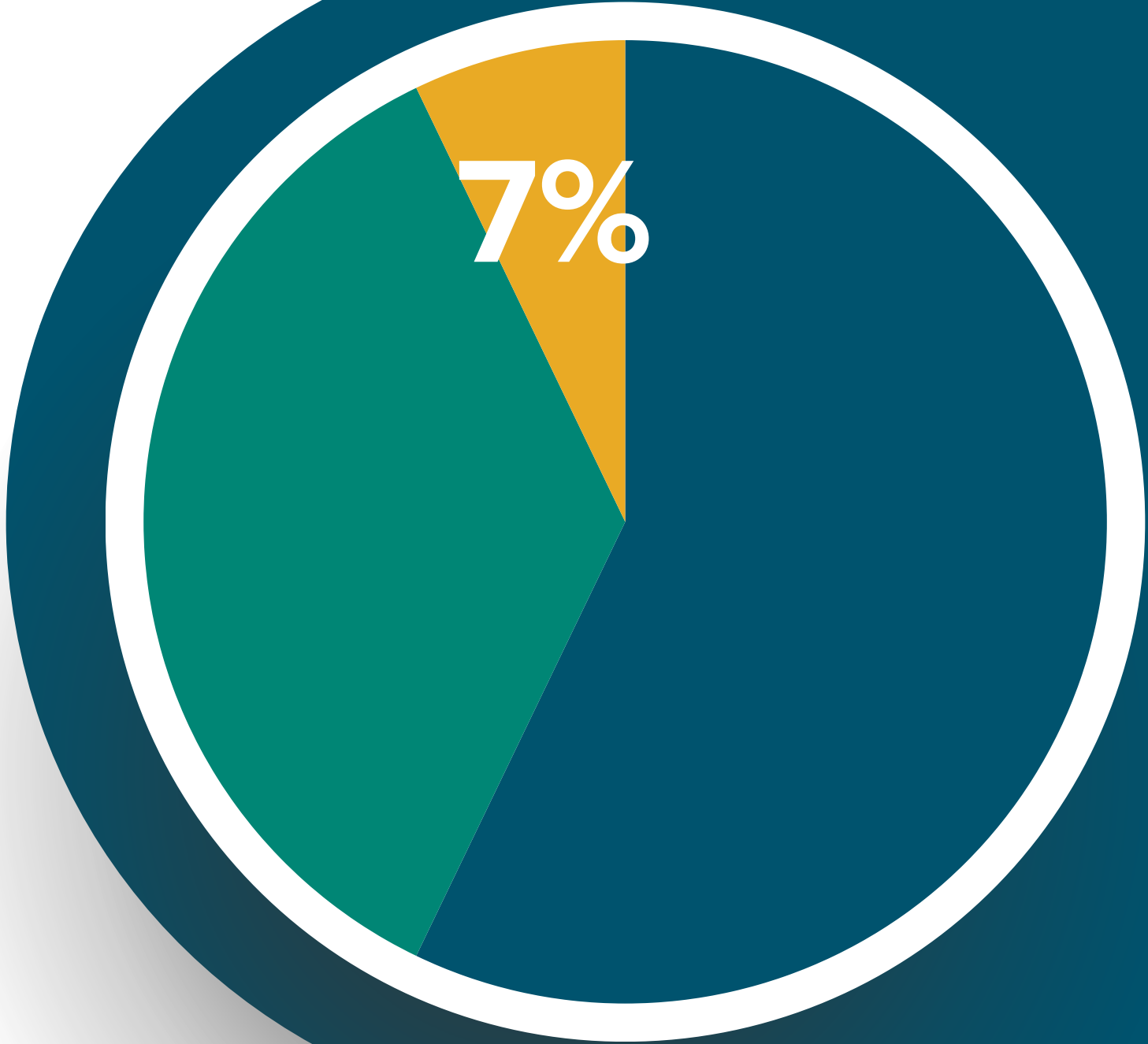
Department Funding Information

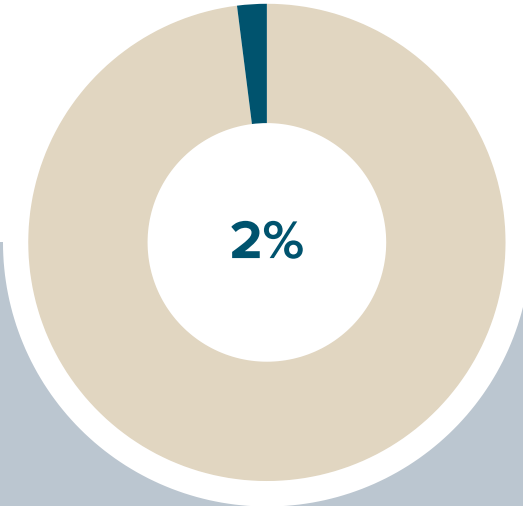
PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

Public Assistance programs are funded through allocation-based funding.

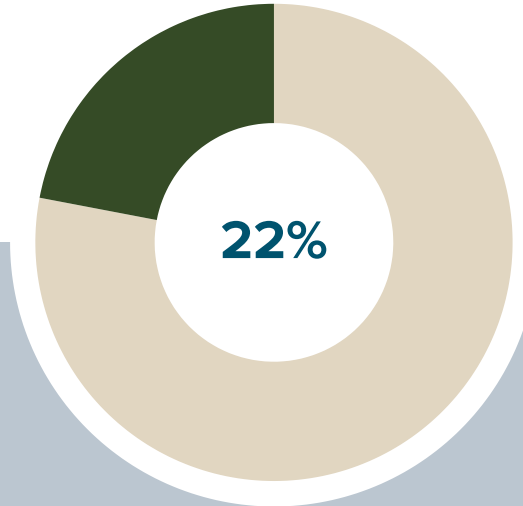
Staffing reimbursement is claimed through time study-based reporting to the California Department of Social Services.

Benefits are issued to the customer and then reimbursed by the Federal and State agencies.

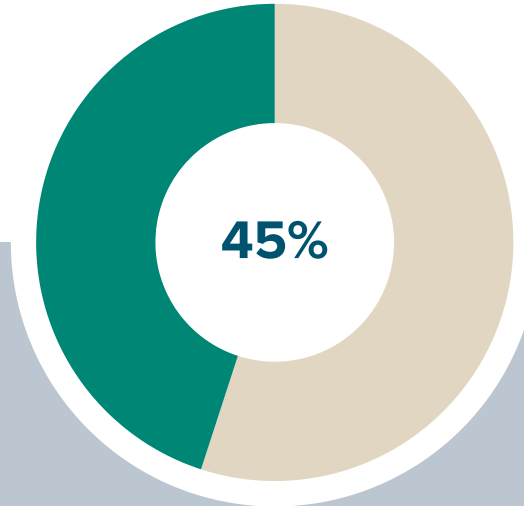
The County is responsible for paying a portion of the benefits through money received from realignment funding.

CHILD & ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES

Child & Adult Protective Services programs are funded through a combination of allocation and realignment funding.

Most funding needs to be renewed on an annual basis through claiming.

Realignment funding received does roll over to the following years.

Special funding is received from the Social Security Administration to pay operating costs for Community Care Expansion efforts.

PUBLIC HEALTH

Public Health programs are mostly funded by grants received. Money from grants must be spent on items outlined in the grant.

Grants received may span multiple years but do have an end date.

This division receives realignment funds for mandated programs.

Homeless funding is done through a combination of allocation-based funding and grants.

Allocation based funding for these programs has a portion that rolls over but is due to expire within the next couple of years. The other portion is annual funding that is received through claiming methods for reimbursement.

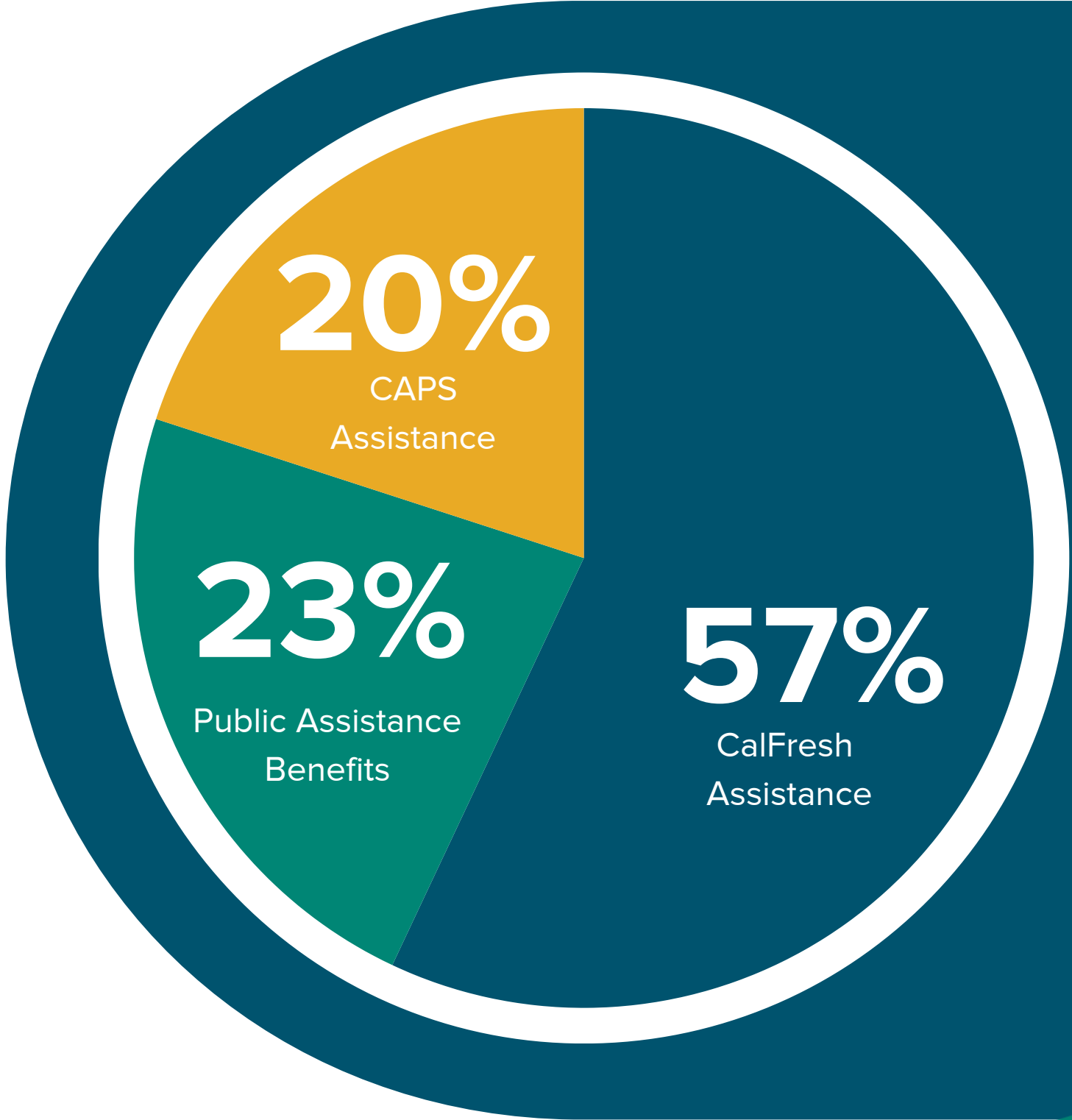
