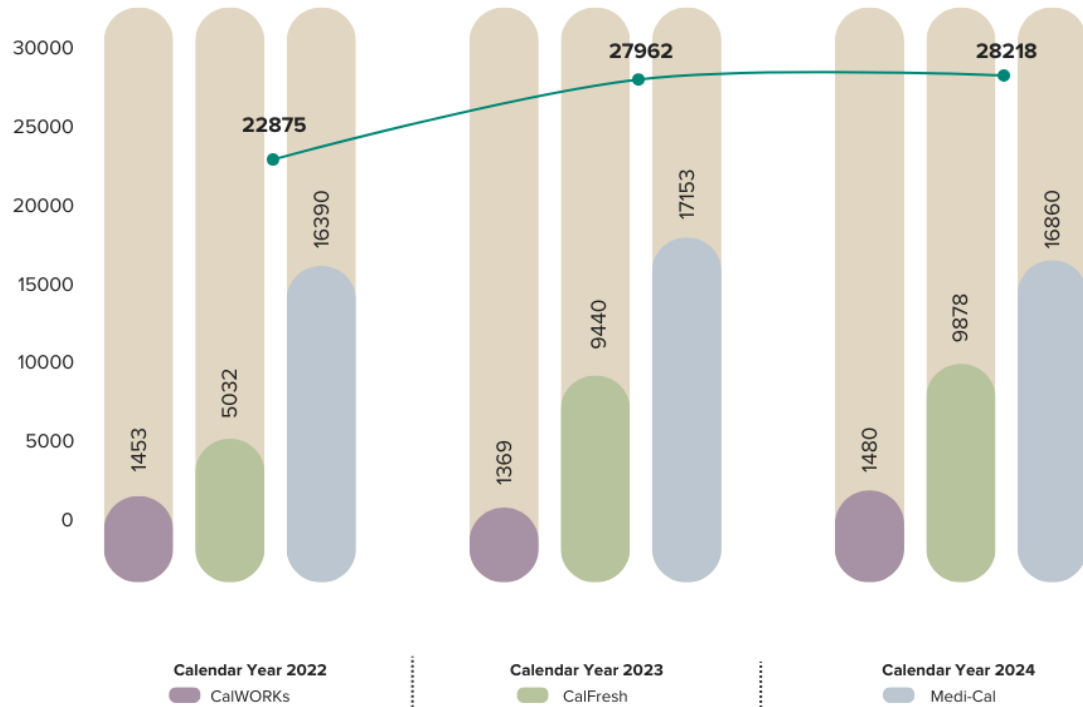

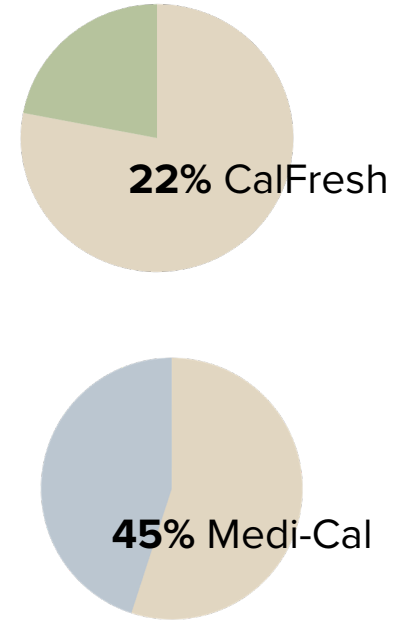

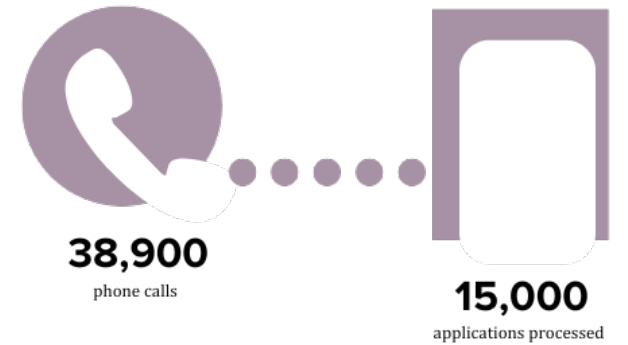
Programs Managed by Year

11th Annual Fundraiser

The event was another big success, raising \$10,492 and marks a total \$77,597 contributed by HHS employees to the **Geweke Caring For Women Foundation**.

Staff contributions have helped 38 local families, funded new screening equipment, and assisted with the purchase of a patient transportation van.



Catapult Lockdown Drill

Employees tested their knowledge of the building, the catapult system, and how to react during a lockdown emergency.

Nobody wants a lockdown to happen, but if it does employees should be prepared. Using a trauma informed approach, HHS tested the Catapult EMS application, employees' ability to log into the system during an emergency, their ability to locate a safe room and secure themselves inside, and their overall response during this type of an emergency. The drill surfaced some valuable lessons learned but was ultimately very successful.

"This is an important training to be prepared and focus on our safety."
